Chinese Ambassador visits Chancellor College

In his familiarization tour of the country, the new Chinese Ambassador to Malawi, His Excellency Wang Shi-Ting visited the University of Malawi Central Office and Chancellor College on Saturday 4 June 2016. At Chancellor College, the Ambassador toured the newly rehabilitated library, including the office housing the Confucius Centre, and some of the newly tiled classrooms. He expressed happiness with the Malawi Government's efforts in promoting higher education, stressing that education is the bedrock of the development of any nation. Having passed through corridors of different universities in

his studies, he mentioned that he makes it a point to visit and appreciate university systems in any country he serves on ambassadorial missions.

In his remarks, the Principal of the College, Prof Richard Tambulasi

thanked the Ambassador for having chosen Chancellor College as one of the institutions to be visited. He mentioned that although the College is blessed with plenty of land, only a quarter of this land is developed.

Most of the land is undeveloped due to lack of resources. The College is therefore not operating at its maximum in contributing to the socio-economic development of the nation. The remaining land is being envisioned for expansion of teaching and learning spaces, students' accommodation, and sports facilities, among many other uses. The Principal further lamented that the small portions of space that have been developed lack sufficient furniture (students' chairs and desks), laboratory equipment and modern teaching facilities.

Before his departure, the Ambassador assured the College management that his office is open for discussions on proposals regarding the development of the College.

ECAMA courts Chanco in post-budget deliberations

On 7th June, 2016 a few members of the Economics Association of Malawi (ECAMA) visited

Chancellor College in order to have a discussion on the 2016/2017 Malawi Government budget.

During the discussions, Mr Kachaje, the President of ECAMA, pointed out that their organization had suggested a number of changes to government on the formulation of the budget, including

widening the tax base. A number of their suggestions have been taken on board by the government.

The event was interactive discussion with members of staff and students at Chancellor College, where individuals presented their thoughts on the national budget. Indeed, a number of members of the Chancellor College community made some contributions. Some touched on the matter of taxation, where it was felt that the average working Malawian was already being heavily taxed. Other individuals queried the government procurement policy, and asked ECAMA to pressure government to conduct a review of the procurement act, to see whether it was indeed beneficial in the economic sense.

US Ambassador tours Chancellor College

On 10 June 2016 the USA Ambassador to Malawi, Her Excellency Ambassador Virginia E. Palmer visited Chancellor College on a familiarization tour. She was welcomed by the College's Vice Principal, Registrar, Finance Officer and Librarian.

In his welcoming remarks, the Vice Principal, Prof. Samson Sajidu, explained to the Ambassador that the College still enjoys the status of being the largest high education institution in the country. Chancellor College offers a diverse range of programmes in law, humanities, education, natural sciences and social sciences. The College makes deliberate efforts to enroll students on 50:50 (female: male) basis, and also enrolls students with special needs. He further explained that the College is not operating at its maximum potential for socio-economic development of the nation due to lack of resources. Reference was made to the College's land, of which only a quarter is developed. If all the land was developed with the vision of expanding teaching and learning facilities, students accommodation, sports facilities, recreation spaces and many more as outlined in its draft master plan, the College would be enrolling not less than 20,000 face-to-face students.

Chancellor College currently has a Memorandum of Understanding with the Public Affairs Section of the US Embassy on hosting of the American

Corner which is benefiting students, staff and external users not only as a source of information about the USA but also a source of literature on other issues such as politics, law, business and economics.

At the end of the tour, the Ambassador explained that she was generally impressed with the College regarding the great contributions it makes to the development of the nation. She explained that, with the assistance of her office, there are several opportunities that the College may be exploring in the USA on capacity building such as collaboration with American Universities on both students and staff exchange, the Fulbright Programme and many more. She mentioned that her office will be glad to assist in enhancing such initiatives with the American institutions. She also mentioned that although the concept of American Corners is not currently sufficiently supported as it used to be, she was glad to learn that it is proving extremely useful to users within and outside the College, and pledged to make an effort in assisting in its development.

E-Learning Centre to pilot programmes online

The E-Learning Centre at Chancellor College is set to start offering online programmes. The centre will be piloting two programmes: Bachelor of Arts (Human Resource) offered by the Department of Political and Administrative Studies Department, under the Faculty of Social Science; and University Certificate of Education (UCE) from the Faculty of Education.

According to the E-Learning Centre Director, Dr Antonie Chigeda, there is good progress on the piloting of the programmes, with most of the required groundwork already done. The centre is working on infrastructure

development, as well as engaging the concerned departments to develop programmes and presentation outlines for E-learning delivery.

The Centre will be offering programmes from Chancellor College, and students will be accessing lessons from the satellites that the centre identified in Mzuzu, Lilongwe and Blantyre. The two key modes of delivery are the MOODLE platform which loads content online for students' independent use, and the Video Streaming where students attend scheduled classes at designated places with Tele facilities for lesson delivery.

Geography and Earth Sciences department receives upgrades

The Department of Geography and Earth Sciences has in the past month undergone some notable developments in the form of procurement of furniture and upgrading of offices. This has all been thanks to the

Mining Governance and Growth Support project.

Specifically, the project has seen the refurbishment of all facilities in the department. Through the project, the department has also acquired new furniture for all of its

offices, laboratories and the map library. Additionally, the project has also paid for new doors to be installed in the offices, laboratories and toilets close to the department. Lastly, all offices in the department have been upgraded with air conditioning systems.

The Head of Geography and Earth Sciences Department, Dr Evance

Mwathunga, expresses his delight at the developments. "This work will ensure that the rooms in the department are restored to their original function, instead of being mere lecture rooms," he said. "At college level, this will assist in creating a conducive environment for teaching and learning. We can look forward to training even better skilled geoscientists".

There are some other activities that have been held as part of the project. Delegations were sent on study tours to universities in Australia and South Africa to appreciate how geosciences have developed.

Also in the pipeline are plans to conduct a curriculum review, with the assistance of an external consultant. The department also plans to continue holding career talks in secondary schools around the country. Three teams will also travel around the country visiting mining companies and operations.

In this light, it is heartening when undergraduate students

are given the opportunity to experience this side of academic life from an early stage. This is precisely what happened when seven students in the Population Studies Department, under the mentorship of Dr Jesman Chintsanya, flew to South Africa to attend the 5th ISibalo Conference of African Young

Statisticians in June 2016. The conference attracted representatives from eight different countries.

The students from Chancellor College included Kondwani Mpinga, Clement Mtambo, Ella Lisuntha, Stephen Kumwenda, and Vitumbiko Namondwe (majoring in Demography), and Joel Ng'oma and Abigail Simkoko (Bio-statistics).

The trip was funded by Stats SA. The conference is part of a programme designed to train young and upcoming students in Demography and Statistics, so that they can contribute to the development of their countries.

Dr Chintsanya, who accompanied the students on the trip, expressed his pride for the students' achievement. "Our students need to harness these opportunities in order to upgrade their skill through interaction with other people in the field," he observed.

On 6th June 2016, the State President, Prof. Arthur Peter Mutharika, who is also Chancellor of the University of Malawi, launched the Ecosystems Based Adaptation for Food Security Assembly (EBAFOSA) at Bingu International Conference Centre in Lilongwe.

EBAFOSA is the first all-inclusive pan-African institution and framework that provides a platform for all stakeholders in a country to collaborate in a participatory manner in developing and implementing policy solutions to upscale EBA-

driven agriculture and its value chains to combat food insecurity, climate change, ecosystem degradation and poverty in Africa.

Realizing its role as part of the EBAFOSA Secretariat, Chancellor College displayed some of the EBA projects it is implementing with the involvement of local communities. These included the Malawi Farmer to Farmer Agroecology (MAFFA) project, Tipindule ndi Nsomba, Nsomba Nchuma, the Farmer-Led Agroecological Farming (Seed Sovereignty and Food Sovereignty) project, and the Environmental Justice and Sustainability Clinic, a project by students led by Mr. Chikosa Banda.

The Principal of Chancellor College, Prof. Richard Tambulasi attended the event to show full support and commitment of the University of Malawi to

the cause.

The University of Malawi, Chancellor College in particular, is delighted to play a leading role and to be part of this movement.

Zomba Action Project donates laptop to Special Needs student

On the morning of 30th May, 2016, the college held a small function at the Special Needs Section, located on the ground floor of the college library, where a laptop computer was handed over to Mr Alinane Misomali, a second year visually impaired education student.

The laptop was donated by the Zomba Action Project (ZAP), which was represented by Mr Zondiwe Mbano, a lecturer in the Language and Communications Department, and Mr Tom Matande. Also present at the function were the College Vice Principal, Professor Samson Sajidu, the College Registrar, Mrs Mary Wasiri, and the Dean of Students, Dr. Jonas Mwatseteza.

The Zomba Action Project is a group of volunteers that comprises people from Zomba, as well as some individuals from Northern Ireland. They run a number of charitable activities in Malawi, including the provision of bursaries for various students in

secondary schools, as well as disbursement of scholarships for students at Chancellor College, Zomba Theological College, Mzuzu University, and Nasawa Technical College, among others. The group raises funds every year, which are channeled towards various areas of need in the education sector in Malawi. They also send materials, including computers and clothes.

During the function, the Vice Principal

observed that the Zomba Action Project had proved themselves as true partners of the college. "Thank you very much for all the help you render to our students. We really appreciate the gesture, as these are friends indeed," he said. "We don't take the gesture for granted." Upon receiving the laptop, Mr Misomali pledged to work hard, and expressed his wish that God would bless the donors abundantly.

Seen in the wider context of learning opportunities for special needs students, this donation has come at the

right moment. For some time, the Special Needs section has been facing a number of problems.

The Special Needs Section houses a few talking computers used by the students. These computers, which were donated by Sight Savers International, assist the students in accessing handouts and material from the internet. The section also has a Braille embosser and a scanner. Most of the equipment was provided through donations from Strathclyde University in Scotland.
