SCIENCE

Second UPGRO Survey underway in Malawi

A number of academics in the Faculty of Science at Chancellor College are part of the UPGRO: Hidden Crisis research project underway in Malawi. Like in Uganda and Ethiopia, where the survey is also being undertaken, the survey takes an in-depth look at the reasons behind low levels of functionality of hand pumped boreholes in four districts in Malawi: Balaka, Lilongwe,



Machinga and Nkhotakota. Across these four districts 50 water points were selected from an original survey sample of 200 boreholes which were surveyed in phase one in 2016.

Each water point, over two days, is undergoing deconstruction and detailed investigations of the hand pump materials and condition, the aquifer properties, borehole design, water quality and recharge processes, being before reconstructed and handed back to the community. Simultaneously,

detailed community social surveys, including focus groups and village mapping exercises, are being conducted. Unlocking the Potential of Groundwater for the Poor (UPGro), is an international research

programme funded by UK's Department for International Development (DFID), Environment Natural Research Council (NERC) and the Economic and Social Research Council (ESRC). It focuses on improving the evidence base around groundwater availability and management in sub-Saharan Africa (SSA) to enable developing countries and partners in SSA to use groundwater in a sustainable way in order to benefit the poor. The UPGro Malawi team comprises Dr Evance Mwathunga, Dr Theresa Mkandawire, Chikondi Shaba, Sembeyawo Banda and Patrick Makulini. For more more information, visit https://upgro-hidden -crisis.org.

National Geographic Society supports Chanco research on Geomorphotectonic Evolution

The National Geographic Society recently awarded a research grant to support a project jointly hosted by Departments of Geography and Earth Sciences and Biological Sciences at Chancellor College. This is a homegrown (Chancellor College-initiated) multidisciplinary project drawing expertise from both the geological and biological sciences. The project is led by Dr. Zuze Dulanya. Other investigators include Dr. D. Kafumbata, Dr. M. Chikuni, Dr. Annette (Tuebingen Juginger University) and Prof. Friedemann Schrenk University). (Frankfurt The research is aimed at examining the

development and evolution of the Middle Shire Rift in terms of tectonics, geomorphology and biology.

This understanding has implications on long term water resources sustainability of the Middle Shire in view of dynamic climatic and tectonic processes. Of utmost significance is the understanding of the rates and mechanisms of biological evolution such as species radiation (e.g. Homo sp.) for the past nearly 2 Million years of the earth's history.

The project will run from January 2018 to December 2018.

There are plans to establish a centre for the study of SiSwati as an attempt to stop the decline of the SiSwati language in Swaziland. This is upon seeing that, even though ŠiSwati

Upon receiving the visitors, the Director of CLS, Dr. Winfred Mkochi expressed optimism regarding the forging of ties with the guests.

Chancellor College boasts expertise in its various sections. The library is one of such sections, as proven by the achievements of its staff. Ms. Jessy Mphunda and Mrs. Nancy Mpekansambo, senior

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librarians at the Chancellor College library, recently made the college proud when they won a grant in a competition run by the African Libraries Project. The competition required that African libraries participating in ALP design proposals outlining activities that would assist their local communities. Staff at the library worked on such a proposal, which the two ladies presented at the Annual African Libraries Project Summit at Kanye in Botswana, held from 11th to 18th November, 2017. Other countries, including Kenya, Ghana, Sierra Leone, Lesotho, Swaziland and Botswana were also represented at the Summit.

The Chancellor College librarians made entitled presentation Improving the Capacity of Teachers to Manage School Libraries through Training". The paper identified the existing problem of untrained school librarians, and meticulously outlined the college library's strategy in providing the required training. One of the underlying aims of this exercise is to improve literacy and the reading culture in Malawi. The proposal from Chancellor College emerged as the best, and was granted funding to ensure the training of 23 teacher librarians.
